Sibhros moved to Kenya from Uganda and started dating a man she met in the Kawangware community.

They lived together and he took good care of her, but when she became pregnant, he left her. She soon found out he had a wife and another family, and he abandoned her and their unborn child.

Sibhros was so distraught she planned to kill her baby and take her own life.

While she was in this very dark place, she met Salome and Peter, counselors at the CARE for AIDS center in Kawangware. Salome counseled Sibhros through her depression and helped her accept the new child as a blessing, not a curse.

Sibhros gave birth to a healthy, HIV-negative baby girl and is now able to sustain herself and her child through the skills she learned in the program.

OBJECTIVES & MODEL

Each CARE for AIDS center operates within an African church, which is local, cost effective, and discreet for our clients. The center has two local Kenyan or Tanzanian staff workers who guide 80 clients through a nine-month process. We have adopted a collaborative model to deliver better care for a reduced cost by partnering with hospitals, other NGOs, and corporations to help provide medication, food, Bibles, education, and training.

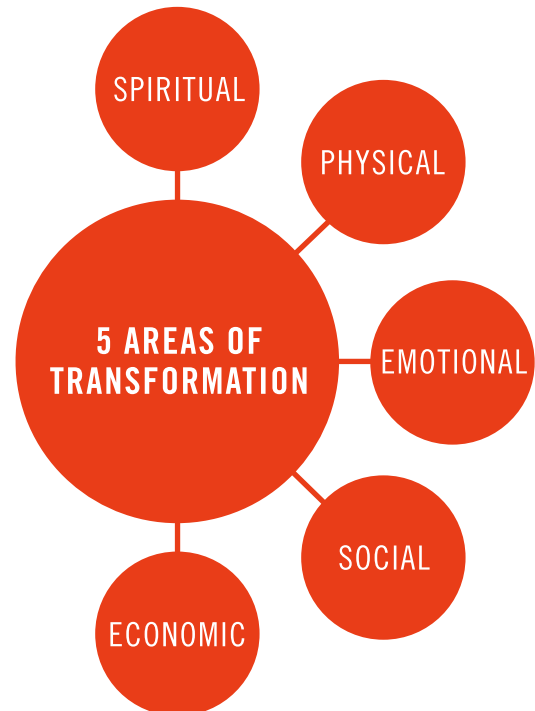
SPIRITUALLY: The Gospel is shared early and often with each of the clients in the program.

PHYSICALLY: The counselor reviews proper drug adherence, hygiene, and nutrition with the client and provides a supplemental weekly food portion.

EMOTIONALLY: Through one-on-one counseling and home visits, counselors address the issue of self-stigma throughout the program leading each client toward a healthy expression of dignity and self-worth.

SOCIALLY: Once clients enter the program, they have the opportunity to see they are not alone. By participating in group counseling and forming peer support groups, our clients will have a community of friends to encourage and assist them after the program has ended.

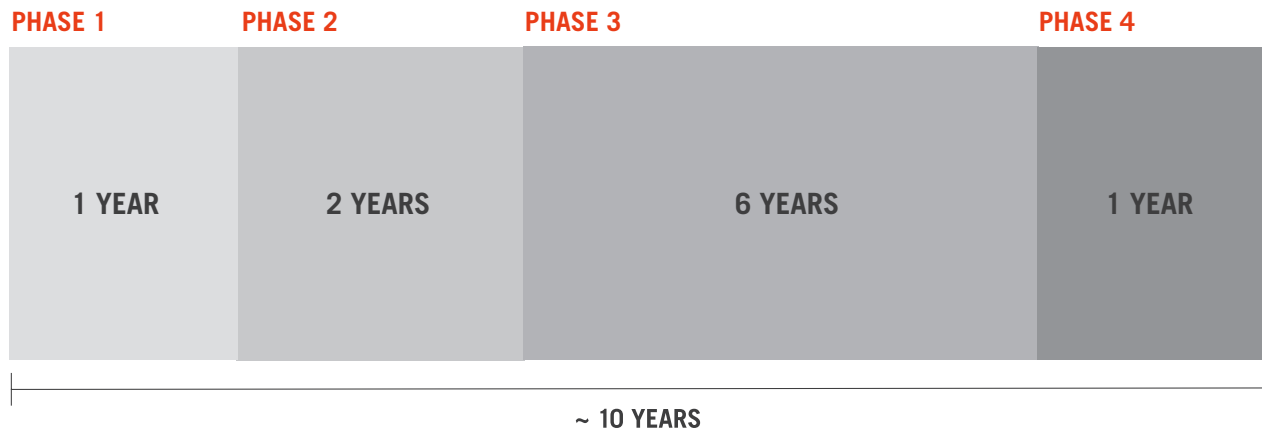
ECONOMICALLY: Twice a month, clients attend a group seminar. Seminar topics vary from financial literacy to practical skills like soap-making and beadwork.



NEW INITIATIVES

As CARE for AIDS continues to grow, we are constantly looking for ways to innovate and improve our programs. This year we are launching a pilot project that will allow us to expand our services to a larger population. Below is a brief overview of our main pilot project for 2018.

Each CARE for AIDS center will operate for 8-10 years in a community. This program lifespan will be broken into four distinct program phases, as outlined below.



PHASE 1: OUTREACH

During phase one, CARE for AIDS staff will design and operate community-based sensitization programs including HIV testing services. This phase will double as a recruitment mechanism as well as an opportunity to educate the general community and reduce HIV related stigma.

PHASE 2: ORPHAN PREVENTION

Phase two is a version of the current model for clients who are most vulnerable and at risk of death due to opportunistic infection.

PHASE 3: OPEN RECRUITMENT

Phase three is a version of the current model open to any HIV+ client regardless of their physical health status.

PHASE 4: ONGOING SUSTAINABILITY

Phase four is an opportunity to invest further in our partner church and former clients. This phase also allows us to create greater sustainability in communities after CARE for AIDS exits.

FOUNDING STORY

In the summer of 2007, Justin Miller, Zach Fallon and Josh Titus, college students from the U.S., went on a trip to Kenya to produce a documentary. There, they were confronted by the harsh realities of life for HIV+ men and women. During their trip, these friends were hosted by Cornel Onyango and Duncan Kimani, two visionary Kenyans who shared a similar passion and calling to help those living with HIV/AIDS. Seeing both the physical and spiritual needs of this marginalized group, Justin, Zach and Josh teamed up with Cornel and Duncan and set out to make an impact. In October 2007, they founded an organization called CARE for AIDS. As juniors in college, Justin, Zach and Josh began to raise the funds required to open the first ever CARE for AIDS center. That center opened its doors to the community in January 2008. The partnership formed with Cornel and Duncan continues to this day, as they serve as the East African Directors for CARE for AIDS. The founding vision of CARE for AIDS was Kenyan born and Kenyan raised. The U.S. team partners to provide the resources to equip and empower the people of Africa to care for their own. As long as CARE for AIDS exists, there will always be Africans running the ministry on the ground.

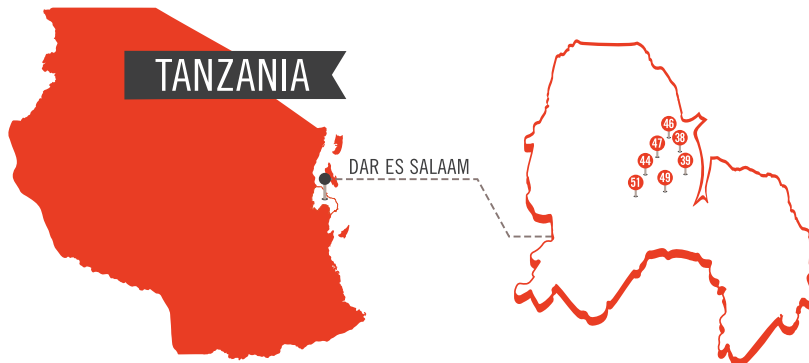
