

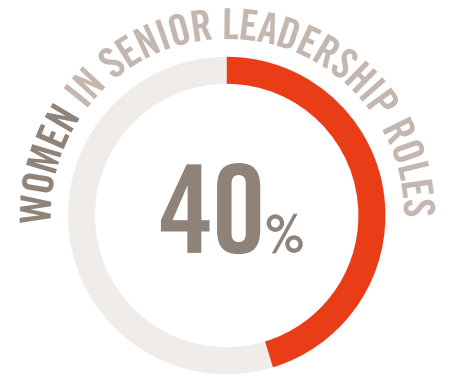
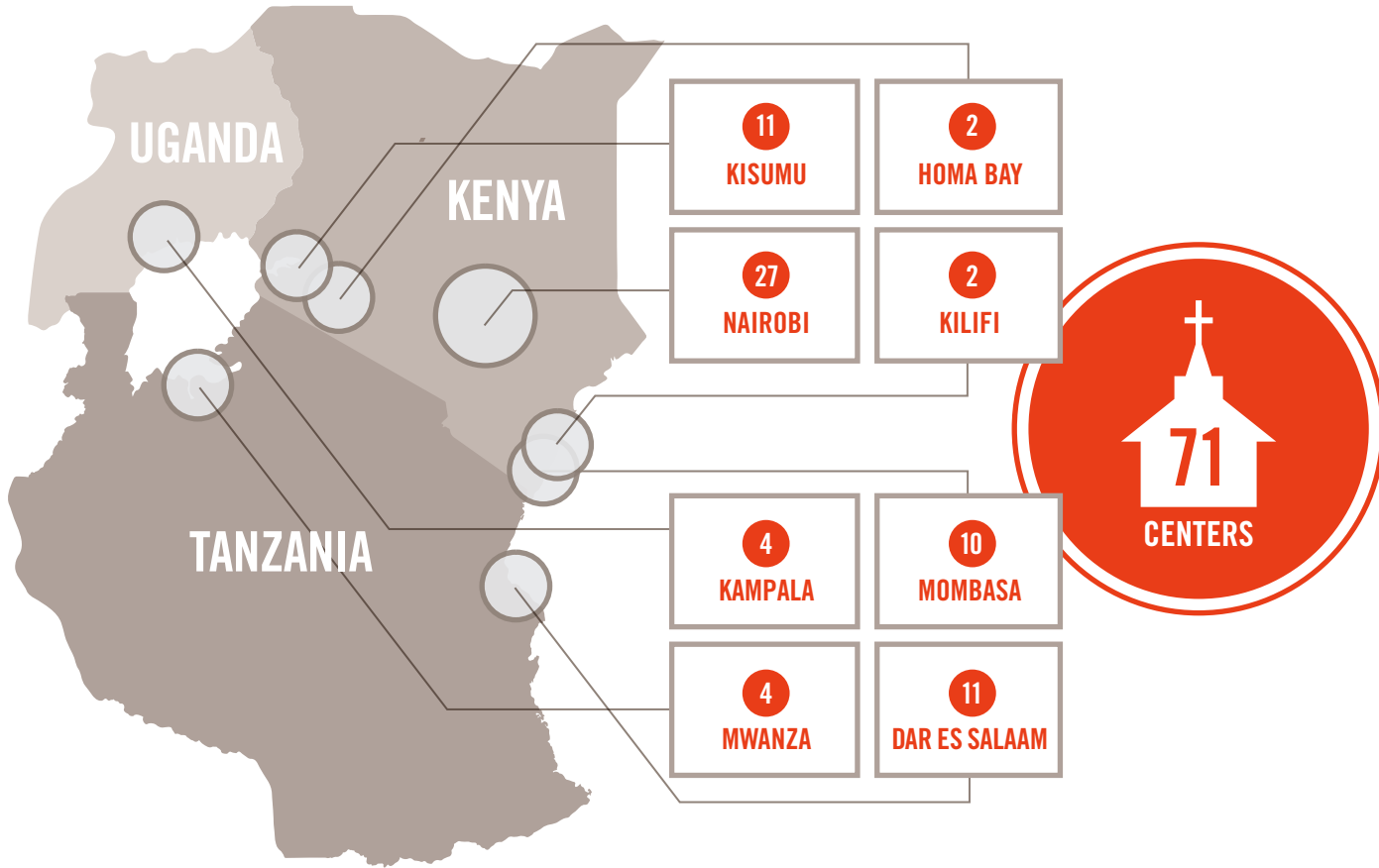

# KEY PROGRAM METRICS



## EMOTIONAL HOPE

69% of clients had disclosed their status to family and friends at graduation compared to 58% at intake.  
99% of clients said they felt better off emotionally after the program.



## ECONOMIC STABILITY

58% of clients reported being members of a savings group at graduation compared to 30% at intake.  
96% of clients said they felt better off economically after the program.



## PHYSICAL WELLNESS

99% of clients reported a low or undetectable viral load at graduation compared to 95% at intake.  
99% of clients said they felt better off physically after the program.



## SPIRITUAL PEACE

5,354 clients have made first-time faith decisions since CARE for AIDS inception.



## SOCIAL INCLUSION

100% of clients would recommend the program to friends or family members.

## FAMILY MEMBER IMPACT

The impact of the CARE for AIDS program goes beyond the individual clients we work with. Clients are equipped to share what they learn and they often help transform the lives of their family members.

# CLIENT PROFILE



## HILDER & JANE

Hilder and Jane joined the CARE for AIDS center in Baba Dogo in November of 2019. They both grew up in the community near the center and had each experienced extreme poverty throughout their lives. Both women had their first children when they were in their teens, and they each became so desperate to provide for their children that they began working in the sex industry. Hilder and Jane's shared experiences bonded them, and they were each other's support system through many difficult times.

Hilder and Jane came to the CARE for AIDS center as a last resort. They were afraid for their lives after several other local sex workers were killed by the men who paid for their services. They had both turned to intravenous drugs to dull the pain of their work, and they were both HIV+. The CARE for AIDS team is in awe of the bravery it took for these women to seek help, and we have rejoiced alongside them this year as they have worked toward a flourishing life for themselves and their children.

Both Hilder and Jane have successfully ended their dependence on drugs, have transitioned out of working in the sex industry, and have made faith decisions to follow Jesus. Hilder and Jane were trained in many skills throughout the program, but their favorite was sewing, a skill they now use to provide for their families.
